Miriam Buys Trees for Neighborhood

Jewish Home Developments

At its May hearing, the Zoning Board of Review granted Hillside Health Associates a variance for the former Jewish Home for the Aged on Hillside Avenue. The variance allows increased occupancy, increased parking, and reduced landscaping at the site.

Neighbors opposed expanding the Home, which ranks 2nd in the state in size and is situated in a neighborhood of one- and two-family homes. Representatives of the developer convinced the board that the home cannot be profitably run without increasing the number of beds.

City law grants neighbors an automatic right of appeal on any zoning decision. Neighbors of the Jewish Home have chosen to exercise that right and move the

zoning decision to the courts.

In June, the developer got approval from the state health department to operate the home, but with an important condition. It was noted that comparable homes in the state offer parking for 160 to 190 cars, but the zoning board required only 147 spaces for the Jewish Home site. And those spaces are for both the proposed 236-bed nursing home and the 39-unit assisted living facility. The health board conditioned its approval on Hillside providing 160 parking spaces for just the nursing home.

This apparently will force the developer back to the zoning board at the same time that opposition from neighbors to the earlier zoning decision is heating up.
